- 1A. Definitions
 - 1B. Inspiration is the process by which *"God superintended the human authors of the Bible so that they composed and recorded without error His message to mankind in the words of their original writings." (Ryrie, p71)
 - 2B. Inspiration is "that controlling influence which God exerted over the human authors by whom the Old and New Testaments were written. It has to do with the reception of the divine message and the accuracy with which it is transcribed." (L.S. Chafer, *Systematic Theology*, I:61)
 - 3B. Inspiration is "that inexplicable power which the Divine Spirit put forth of old on the authors of Holy Scripture, in order to their guidance even in the employment of the words they used, and to preserve them alike from all error and from all omission." Louis Gaussen, Theopneustia, p25

2A. Scripture

1B. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 -- The extent of Inspiration

1C. The Scope - "All Scripture"

- all Scripture came from God to show us how to live.
- Both Old & New Testaments are designated Scripture.
 - 1 Timothy 5:18 (OT Deut 25:4; NT Luke 10:7)
 - > 2 Peter 3:15-16 (Paul's writings called Scripture by Peter)
 - Titus 2:7-8
- 2C. The Source "...by inspiration of God" (God-breathed) entire Bible

3C. The Purpose – to equip for good works

2B. 2 Peter 1:2 -- The <u>Means</u> of Inspiration 1C. The Means - Holy Spirit used men (human writers).

2C. The Process – The Holy Spirit carried them along. (the will of God)

3B. 1 Corinthians 2:6-13 -- The <u>words</u> and <u>thoughts</u> of Inspiration The Record – words recorded in the Bible (actual words are inspired)

1C. Dual Authorship

- 2C. The full content of the Bible
- 3C. Only the original manuscripts
- 4C. Ultimately a process that is unexplainable
- 5C. A product that is confirmed as inerrant
- 6C. Infallibility for human authors only to the extent of their writings in Scripture
- 2B. Inspiration is not
 - 1C. Revelation
 - 2C. Illumination
 - 3C. Superior or special insight into truth

Important Note: Our understanding of the nature of the inspiration of the Scriptures is often expressed as the following: <u>verbal</u> (words, grammar, etc.), <u>plenary</u> (complete in all aspects) inspiration.*
